

It was a lot of fun and great to be able to do a workshop together after being cooped up all winter.


## Kensington Metro Park April Outing



## Helicon Focus 7 (Stacking Software)

### Contributor – Germaine Finley

This article is to review a product called Helicon Focus 7 and is based on an evaluation copy provided by Helicon for 7 for this article. I thank Helicon for being receptive to our inquiries on the capabilities of their software and wanting to promote an awareness of another option to using Photoshop. While many use Photoshop for focus stacking, Helicon Focus 7 is an alternative product that does not require a subscription and so was very interesting for me to evaluate. Let's start with – what is focus stacking. Focus stacking is a digital image processing technique which combines multiple images taken at different focus distances to give a resulting image with a greater depth of field (DOF) than any of the individual source images. Focus stacking is used heavily in both macro photography as well as landscape photography to give a front to back sharp picture. I did a small test of both the macro and landscape examples to see how easy Helicon was to learn and how well it performed.

*Note - Helicon Focus 7 also has a feature called micro panorama. The micro panorama function is only available in Pro version and will not be reviewed in this article and is designed to stitch images made through a microscope. It may fail to stitch images that were made by camera rotation on the tripod.*

Helicon is easy to install and provides a very descriptive online help and various videos that help illustrate installation, stacking, retouching, Lightroom integration, batch mode processing and their RAW in-DNG-out mode (this helps retain maximum information for further processing). There are 3 versions of Helicon Focus - Lite, Pro & Pro Premium. See this link to help choose what is right for you.

Helicon has **3 main methods** for the stacking algorithm.

- **Method A** computes the weight for each pixel based on its contrast and then forms the weighted average of all pixels from all source images. This method works better for short stacks and preserves contrast and color.
- **Method B** selects the source image containing the sharpest pixel and uses this information to form the "depth map". This method imposes strict requirements on the order of images - it should always be consecutive. Perfectly renders textures on smooth surfaces.
- **Method C** uses pyramid approach to image processing dividing image signals into high and low frequencies. Gives good results in complex cases (intersecting objects, deep stacks), though increases contrast and glare.

If you are using Method B, the software NEEDS the stack in consecutive order or it produces some fuzzy results. There is

a nice **Sort automatically** option which enables the program to analyze the stack and automatically reverse the order of images if needed, allowing to avoid banding artifacts along the image edges. Helicon also has a nice feature of **retouching** to help clean up photos where the subject might have moved a bit – minor movement (ie insect antennae). This feature allows you to select a source file and paint that in. You have a lot of features on how to paint as well with using a color tolerance – to replace a specific color, brush hardness – to select how sharp your brush edge is, cloning areas of your output image to another area on it, etc. Helicon also allows text to be added and/or a size scale to better understand the dimensions of the image.

Helicon says you can have a stack hundreds of photos deep. However, I did not test this and used fairly small stacks given I have an old PC with limited memory and CPU. None of the rendering processes took very long even with my limitations (HP Pavilion, CPU 1.7 GHz 2 core and 8 G RAM)

The 2 controls for stacking are Radius and Smoothing:

**Radius** is a feature that needs to be played with to get the right balance, but is only available in Methods A & B. When performing focus stacking the program analyzes each pixel of the source image in order to define if it is in focus. Then the detected focused areas from the whole stack are combined into one output image. Radius is the control that sets the size of the analyzed area around each pixel. The smaller the value of the Radius is, the sharper the intersecting details are. Increasing the Radius almost eliminates the halo effect that sometimes happens in the stacking process. Excessive increase of the Radius value will negatively affect details. It is a balance and best to try a few values (starting with the default ones Helicon selects) to determine the best result.

**Smoothing** is (per the Helicon help) – *“When analysing the stack, the program detects the most sharply focused areas of source images to combine into one output image.*

*For methods A and C smoothing determines how these sharp areas will be combined. Low smoothing produces a sharper image, but the transition areas may have some artifacts.*

*Setting a high smoothing value will result in a slightly blurry image, though without any visible transition areas.*

*For method B this value determines how depth map will be smoothed out.”*

I used the default value of smoothing but this also should be experimented with for best results given different light and textures.

### Macro example 1 –

In the following example, I used a stack of 20 images taken with my Nikon D810 f/16 1/6 s ISO 400 Tamron 90 mm lens using **Method B** with a **radius=13** and **smoothing=4**. In the first stack shot even at f/16, there was a part of the flower that was not in crisp focus. So this was my first attempt and basically, I was able to shoot the pictures, drag and drop them into Helicon and pressed render. Picture 1 is 1 of the 20 shots in the stack showing the DOF in a single shot. I brought

the output picture (picture 2) into Photoshop in DNG format and reduced the image size for this article.

### Macro example 2 –

In the following example, I used a small stack of 9 images taken with my Nikon D810 f/5.6 1/10 s ISO 100 Tamron 90 mm lens using **Method A** with a **radius=8** and **smoothing=3**. Picture 1 is 1 of the 9 shots in the stack showing the DOF in a single shot. I brought the output picture (picture 2) into Photoshop in DNG format and reduced the image size for this article.

Key feature : With Helicon Focus you can process Raw files opening them directly in the program or importing from Photoshop Lightroom. Output can be done in dng format (Helicon Pro version only), tiff or jpeg. I found the process easy and was able to re-render using different Methods and adjusting the Radius and Smoothing parameters to determine the best results by just changing options and pressing render again.

### Landscape example -

Below is a landscape example where I took 3 shots to focus on the foreground, mid ground and background. I was not able to find a better example but I could see how this would be great for a possible flower foreground and mountain background shot. I used the lakeshore at my cabin with the kayaks in the foreground and a receding shoreline, trying to keep as much in focus as possible in the shot.

There is also a handy dust map feature which will allow dust on the sensor or lenses that would be amplified in the stacked image to be documented and be ignored. See the Helicon help for a detailed explanation of this feature. The advantage of this is obvious.

All in all, I found the program easy to use and flexible in options. The retouching feature is helpful if there is a small part of the image (ie insect movement) that you need to pull from one source image and paint in. This feature I found to require some practice to use.

I am grateful to Helicon Focus for providing a copy of the software for us to evaluate for this article and I would recommend the product especially for people like me that do not like to get hooked into a subscription model.


