David Stimac will be presenting

Please join the April 6th club meeting to hear Dave Stimac, present on the topic of Photographing Wild Flowers.

Dave will be discussing the techniques needed for

creating razor sharp, well-lit exposures of wildflowers. He will cover the ways you can get the most out of your equipment and how to



get into macro photography without spending a fortune. You will learn how to control depth-of-field, light & avoid distractions in your photography. We will also discuss creative techniques that go beyond simple portraits, such as intentional blur and multiple exposures. He will talk about the chronology of bloom among favorite plants, where to look for them and recommend the best identification guides and other sources.

Dave has had an interest in natural history since early on, and he has drawn, painted, carved and photographed animals and plants for over forty years. Dave is an avid



birder, hunter and naturalist and spends as much time as he can outdoors. Waterfowl, in particular, has inspired him for most of his life. He is fascinated by their beauty, behavior and migrations. He hopes that my work conveys the awe and respect he feels for them and all living things. Dave's formal

education took place at the College for Creative Studies, where he received a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in illustration. He has worked as an illustrator, graphic designer and freelance photographer for over thirty years. His work has appeared in Ducks Unlimited,

Wildfowl Magazine, Gray's Sporting Journal, Sports Afield, National Geographic Books, Ranger Rick, Your Big Backyard, Birdwatcher's Digest, and Living Bird.



Dave also uses his photography to teach others about our native flora and fauna in various presentations. He enjoys helping new photographers learn more about their equipment, technique and subject matter. His



workshops help participants master their cameras so that they can better express their creativity and connection to wild places, animals and plants.

Gilmore Car Museum

The <u>Gilmore Car Museum</u> started in the early 1960s when Donald S. Gilmore began collecting vintage automobiles. Some of the first vehicles in his collection included 1927 Ford Model T, a 1913 Rolls Royce, and a 1920 Pierce Arrow. To accommodate his collection he acquired 90 acres of land in southwestern Michigan in a small town known as Hickory Corners.



The Gilmore Car Museum is North America's largest auto museum with nearly 400 vehicles on display and over 189,000 square feet of exhibit space. The Museum's 90-acre Historic Campus features numerous vintage structures including a restored and fully-functioning 1941 Silk City Diner, a recreated 1930s Shell Station, six onsite Partner Museums, and so much more.

Since it is set up sort of like Greenfield Village with about 20 buildings holding different brands of cars or different subjects it is probably best to go on a very nice day so you can walk around comfortably. Also on some warm weekends different automobile clubs will have events at the museum and many cars will be on display on grassy areas.

Photo Tiles

As photographers we love capturing just the right image, whether for documentation of a trip, a particular

location, person or animal, favorite subject, etc. We sometimes share them over the internet, post on Facebook, print them and hang them on our walls, make an album or sell them. Others sit in our cell phones or on our computers occasionally getting located when a friend asks about family, trips or other events.



Finding creative ways to share our photographs is difficult for some of us. That is why I like sharing ideas when I run across them. At a recent trade show, I found a photographer who creates decorative tiles with her photographs. She attaches the pictures by Mod Podge (available in craft stores) to plain white tiles she picks up at Home Depot and epoxies them so they can be used as coasters, decorative tiles for baths and showers or kitchen back splashes, etc. The reason you need to epoxy the finished tile is that mod podge could become sticky if heat is applied. Try thinking of some of your favorite tiles for this project. Could make a nice useful gift as well.
