Notes -- Assessing the Scope of a Photographic Project – Mark Byrnes Contributor – Kristin Grudzien

Mark Byrnes came to the club to speak on March 6, 2020. He is a very talented photographer and dynamic speaker. In addition to the subject he came to talk about, he let us know that there is going to be a Beard Competition coming to Imlay City in August 8, 2020. Beard Competitions raise money for charity; check out Murder City FHC on Facebook ⓒ Save the DATE and Watch our Facebook Page for more details!

- 1) KNOWING YOUR OBJECTIVE AND HAVING A PLAN
 - a) It is good to push yourself. Don't be afraid to try new techniques/subjects/equipment
 - b) Realize what you love and do it. Do you like Nature, Portraits, Sports Photography, etc.?
 - c) Embrace an "I CAN DO" attitude.
 - d) The Steps to Success are not "A" to "B"; they are the many steps from "A" to "Z", smaller accomplishments build to greater successes.
- 2) CHOOSING AND PREPARING YOUR GEAR Ask Yourself
 - a) Where is the shoot? Example: The Detroit Parade Clown Shoot is both indoor and outdoor; need to have set ups for both situations. The group shot is on the steps of the Detroit Institute of Arts (200 clowns).
 - What non-photography equipment does the location require? The Group shot for the Clowns requires not only 10-foot ladders but also lighting as it happens very early morning (the parade starts at 9:00 a.m. and the clowns need be in line before then).
 - ii) How are you and the subjects getting to the location? The clowns arrive by bus; the photographers get to the location by car. Make sure you have what ever passes are necessary to get past physical barriers so you aren't late for your client.
 - b) What photography equipment does the shoot require?
 - i) Cameras, lenses, back up equipment
 - (1) Make sure all cameras, batteries, memory cards, and accessories are charged & ready
 - ii) Lighting, reflectors, etc. Make sure all lights are charged and stands are ready to go.

- c) Reverse engineer the shoot
 - i) Envision the image you want and have a plan
 - ii) Make sure you have the equipment to create the final image
 - (1) Colors are important, Variety is important
 - (2) Don't work hard to fix something that isn't broken
- 3) BE CREATIVE AND KNOW YOUR SUBJECT
 - a) What does the Subject want out of the shoot? The Clowns want a record of their adventure.
 - b) What are their expectations? They want to remember the day and the fun they had.
 - c) What is their vision? One of the clowns was a very tall gentleman (taller than the backgrounds Mark was using), but Mark knew he was a football player, so he had him take a "football" stance in his clown costume. It worked ^(C)
 - d) Is there an emotional connection? Does the viewer connect with the image?
 - e) Is there pride in your effort?
 - f) In some situations, you might want to accentuate a certain feature. But in other situations, you may want to hide or minimize that same feature.
- 4) IMPROVING and EXPANDING OPPORTUNITIES TO GROW
 - a) Grow a group of people you can depend on
 - i) Plan and trust your team to carry out your vision
 - ii) Develop trust with your client and improve their experience every time
 - iii) Make life easier for the customer
 - b) Relationships matter
 - You can't get people to do anything for you if you don't reciprocate; build relationships
 - ii) If you find someone's weakness, HELP them; DON'T EMBARRASS Them!
 - (1) BE GENTLE!
 - (a) People take things personally
 - (b) DON'T Discourage them
 - (c) HELP them improve WITHOUT Embarrassing them
 - (d) Be NICE to other photographers
 - iii) It is good to be Versatile!
