Good Times in a Bad Land

As we rode ... we rose and fell between its delicate parallels of rose and cream and sublime shapes, chalk white, fretted against a blue sky with high floating clouds; the sky itself seemed only there to cleanse and light the vast harmonious building scheme." This past September Gary and I joined several other members from Seven Ponds Photography Club for a weeklong photography trip to Badlands National Park. The Badlands encompass 240,000 acres of stunning geologic wasteland in the southwestern corner of South Dakota and is a scenic and wildlife photography paradise. Ward McGinnis took lead and did a fantastic job organizing this trip. Accommodations were made at the Badlands Interior Motel & Campground, a short 5-minute drive from the Interior Entrance of the park. The day we arrived, Ward took us all on a quick tour of the North Unit of the park via the Badlands Loop Road. Nothing could have prepared us for that first look of the park. Every turn along the road the topography changed. We drove by hoodoos, pointy spires, towering pinnacles, square-edged buttes banded with red, tan, and yellow clay and sandstone, fortresses and castles, brightly colored yellow countless other strange rock mounds and

formations that defied description. It felt as though we had landed on Mars.



The Badlands is also home to the largest undisturbed mixed-grass prairie in the United States and further down the Loop the landscaped shifted. Grassy hills and meadows opened before us and we



saw the first signs of wildlife in the park. Black-Tailed Prairie dogs were at play, meadowlarks were singing, bighorn sheep were climbing

behind us and a couple of pronghorn antelope ran off in front of us. The scene was surreal.

We continued on to Pinnacles Overlook to capture our first sunset of the week and we wondered if the day could get any better.



After the sun set we drove to an area called the Cantata Basin and as dusk turned to night, we found



ourselves peering into some of the darkest skies found in North America. Millions of stars, light years away filled the heavens for us to focus on. A perfect ending to a perfect day.

The next morning, we were up before dawn to capture the light of a new day. Ward had picked out a spot called Windows. Sunrise at Windows is a religious experience. The sky begins to brighten rendering views that are alien, almost primordial.



As the sun rises shades of reds, yellows, pinks and purples paint rugged wind-ravaged stone, bringing out the awe and wonder in a person and left me to witness the glory of a new day through tear filled eyes.

The rest of the day and the rest of the week awarded us one amazing adventure after another. Each unique and all presenting incredible photo opportunities. As we drove through the South Unit of the park a herd of Bison raced up hill and then as if out of nowhere stampeded across the road directly in front of us.



Huge bulls lingered behind keeping a close eye on us to ensure the safe crossing of the herd. Others stopped to graze. We witnessed bison dusting. Red dogs stayed close to their mothers while other bulls led the herd forward. Our own private National Geographic show for our cameras to document.

We drove past field after field of thousands of sunflowers dancing in the wind.



Another day we explored the underworld at Wind Cave National Park, the first cave to be designated a National Park anywhere in the world. It is also one of the longest and most complex caves in the world and home to boxwork, a unique formation rarely found elsewhere. Flash photography was permitted so we did our spelunking with cameras in tow.

The club is guided by a Board of Directors consisting of a President, two vice Presidents a Secretary a Treasurer and a Competition manager. All of these are elected positions from and by the members. The club also has a "Kickoff" committee that organizes the annual January kickoff (dinner) for our first meeting of the year. This generally consists of 5 or 6 members willing to do a little extra work at arranging for food and etc. Last year's Kickoff committee was Kristin Grudzien, Karen Ormiston, Denise Joans, Dale Vronch and Melody Munro-Wolfe. This meeting is generally our biggest turn out and it's an opportunity to socialize with other members.

Starting two years ago we put together a Trip Committee. The Trip Committee puts together at least one day trip per month and three weekend trips for the year. These trips have become very popular and it's a great place for the beginning photographer to hang out and shoot with the more experienced photographers. Sometimes getting great one on one lessons! If you attend these don't be afraid to ask for assistance or just ask someone how and why they might be shooting in a particular way. These trips have been to spring wildflower locations, the Polar Express in Owosso, Model shoots, glass blowing factories, Downtown Detroit walks, and Dow Gardens butterfly house and a July Fourth fireworks at Bay City. The weekend trips have included spring wildflowers in Mackinaw, warbler migration at Tawas, Sliver Lake sand dunes and fall colors in the Leelanau Peninsula. Individual club members have posted day shoots as well: Stu invited everyone to join him at the first annual Busker Fest in Imlay City, also the rodeo event at the Eastern Michigan Fair and a trip to Greenfield Village. This year I had planned to revisit the Badlands and I opened that up to club members as well. It was fun having a group on the road for a week! Last year official Trip Committee consisted of Jerry Badgero, Buddy Beyer, Todd Bielby, Chris Fisher and Sally Kwaiser.

Other volunteers include Mark Robinson who edits and publishes the newsletter and Dale Vronch who runs an editing workshop at his home studio the last Friday of each month. And several years we have offered beginning photography classes free to whoever wants to attend. The teachers of those classes are also volunteers. And of course the volunteers that bring cookies to the meetings! I'm sure I'm forgetting others that have volunteered and for that please forgive me.

The club doesn't exist without everyone pitching in and doing something. Each year we have people that step down from a position leaving room for new faces and new ideas. This is what keeps the club going and keeps it interesting. Example: The Trip Committee. It's good to keep a couple of people that have been on the committee to repeat a location shoot but it's also good to get new people with new ideas in this committee. Example: The first year someone mentioned the glass blowing factory. That is something I never would have thought of! I couldn't make that shoot but the photo's posted from that shoot had me wishing I had! New people with new ideas are needed!

So this year when you hear the club ask for member volunteers please jump in and be a part of the team. We need you!
