Feature – Meijer Gardens

I decided not just to feature our wonderful members but also some of the wonderful places we visit as a club. In this issue, we will show a little more of Meijer Gardens. Tina organized a club meet up there and I thought it deserved more information than the normal short activity summary.

Frederik Meijer Gardens & Sculpture Park is a 158acre botanical garden, art museum, and outdoor sculpture park located in Grand Rapids Township, Michigan, United States. Meijer Gardens has Gardens, Sculptures and Events.

Gardens:

Outside there is the DeVos Japanese Garden, designed by Hoichi Kurisu.

The garden has many sculptures in a winding trail around a pond complete with small waterfalls, an arched bridge, a boat launch, a zen garden, a bonsai garden, and a tea house. Our group was fortunate to have arrived right when the cherry trees were blooming. People from all over came to see the blossoms and this trail was shoulder to shoulder full of people on the Saturday we were there but Friday was clear, so if you want to photograph the cherry blossoms without crowds, it is recommended to go in the morning on a weekday.

There is also the Gwen Frostic Woodland Shade Garden, several meandering nature trails, a Perennial Garden, the Earl & Donnalee Holton Arid Garden, a carnivorous plant garden, a Children's Garden and a Michigan Farm Garden. Each garden is unique and has themed sculptures placed throughout. Many photo opportunities for macro lenses on the trail with flowers exist in addition to the larger subjects.

Between the sculpture park and the Japanese garden is a waterfall and Koi fishpond. This is a nice cool place to rest on the rocks or on a bench and watch the fish.

There is also the Lena Meijer Tropical Conservatory for an inside tropical experience. There are over 500 species of plants and flowers from five continents inside, a waterfall, a small stream, and a few small birds.

Sculptures:

Aside from all the many sculptures in the sculpture park, there are sculptures from the entryway to every bend in the trails and the conservatory. Taking the tram ride helps give an overview of where they all are in the park and a little history of each. If you want to walk the whole park, pick up a copy of the *Guest Guide & Map* booklet which identifies each sculpture.

There are many volunteers that will provide a lot of additional information, like one we ran into in the gallery where you are surrounded by the 4 Marble faces of Utopia. A beautiful sculpture of a very large scale. There are even sample pieces of the marble that you can touch at the information counter and get the history of how the piece was made and transported to Meijer Gardens.



Events:



Of course, Meijer Garden is famous for their annual butterfly exhibit. This took place mid-April to early May this year.

This is a very popular event and well worth the trip for that alone.

There is also the Concerts at Meijer Gardens concert series. Tuesday nights from June 1st – Sept 15th bring the finest national and international musicians to Meijer Gardens. Oct 1-31st is the annual celebration of autumn, <u>Chrysanthemums & More!</u> Event. It is the largest of its kind in Michigan, featuring expansive chrysanthemum displays, fall foliage and family-friendly activities.

For the holidays, there is a special exhibition:

UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN HEALTH-WEST: CHRISTMAS & HOLIDAY TRADITIONS

This exhibition honors cultures and holiday traditions from around the world. It will have 46 unique displays depicting fact and folklore, past and present.

3-15-2024 - Wildlife photography in the Americas by Paul Wakabayashi

Paul gave an interesting presentation with beautiful example photographs of three different approaches to photographing wildlife in the Americas: solo, photo workshop groups and expedition. Prices ranged from moderate to expensive.

In a solo trip, you are responsible for travel plans, lodging, wildlife research, scheduling, and meals.

In a workshop, the organizer is responsible for travel plans, lodging, wildlife research, scheduling, and meals.

In an expedition, the team is responsible for travel plans, lodging, wildlife research, scheduling, and meals.

Paul has used all three approaches and discussed how all of them required a certain amount of research. It was enlightening to listen as Paul went through his experiences traveling to Newfoundland to search for red foxes, to Costa Rica to photograph some

amazing tropical birds and to Antarctica where he traveled with a scientific team and other photographers. His images from all locations were fantastic but he really wowed all of us with his Antarctica adventure. That trip crossed over from watching National Geographic to living it.





We had the unexpected pleasure of PROCAM sponsoring our event. They provided 3 - \$20 gift cards for the club hand out. The first gift card was awarded for the dirtiest sensor. All of us did a sky shot and the image that showed the most sensor spots won. The winner was Germaine Finley (I did

take my camera into PROCAM later to have it cleaned after that award). The second gift card went to Kristin Grudzien for the lunchtime mystery drawing.

The third and final gift card was awarded to the best photo of the day and was voted on at our May 3rd meeting – that went to Jim. That was super nice of PROCAM to support us with the gift cards.

There was a lot to shoot at the park – the herons were busy at the rookery, ducks were in the pond, swans were swimming, chickadees, woodpeckers and red winged black birds were begging for handouts and the osprey were adding to their nest.

For those that don't know, Kensington has allowed people to hand feed birds near the Nature Center for years. This has been going on for as long as I can remember, and the birds will come and quickly grab a seed or two from your hand if you are still.

This behavior helps bring the birds closer as they will follow you down a trail and perch in nearby trees to see if you might have a little something for them. The red winged blackbirds seem to be the most forward and will call down to you in addition to following. Note: Do not give food to the Sandhill cranes as they can get a little aggressive demanding what they feel is their share. If you don't feed them, they will wander away... eventually.



5-17-2024 – <u>Zen Photography</u> <u>Workshop</u> – by LeeAnn McLaneGoetz / Germaine Finley (assisting)



LeeAnn put on a full and informative workshop at Seven Ponds during our 3rd Friday meeting. 19 members and 1 guest showed up despite a threatening thunderstorm. It was well attended for both the lecture portion and the workshop. The lecture part covered several key elements that we would need to keep in mind while putting together a composition in our sandbox.

We reviewed **Patterns** (dots, lines, shapes, forms, colors, and shapes), **Types of Patterns** (mosaics, branching, waves, fractals, spirals, etc), **Repetition** (predictability, contrasting pairs and progression of steps) and **Flow** (movement, direction) in photography.

An example of each of these was shown to help illustrate the terms. After the lecture, the groups broke into smaller groups (2 to a table) and were each given their kit. https://www.meijergardens.org/

This kit would be very expensive, well over \$25+ if bought on your own but thanks to LeeAnn getting all the materials in bulk, it was only \$10 at the meeting. There are 4 kits leftover from the class and available on a first come first served basis - \$15 each as part of the SPPC club fundraiser. Contact LeeAnn @ rpondsphotoexpo@gmail.com. Aurora Borealis

This is the year that the sun will reach Solar maximum. Solar maximum is the peak in the solar cycle described as an approximately 11-year period of solar activity driven by the sun's magnetic field and indicated by the frequency and intensity of visible sunspots on the sun's surface. What does this mean for us? Well, for one thing it means a lot more chances of seeing the Northern lights (aurora borealis): What they are & how to see them. It also means we are headed for a solar pole reversal. This is not great news for satellites but for photography, this year should be fantastic.



How can you see the Aurora Borealis? There is a whole science behind which factors are best to watch – KP index 5 or greater for southern Michigan, Bz index must be negative, dark skies (look at the light pollution map) as well as the weather report; you will need

clear or fairly clear skies. Remember you probably will only see whitish wisps with the naked eye. May 10^{th} , 2024 super event was a kp9 (super high) and people were able to see faint color in the sky with their eyes. Usually, to see the fantastic colors we associate with the Aurora, you need to use your camera. Cell phones that are capable of night photography are great to record colors as well as your DSLR or Mirrorless cameras. The lower the KP index, the further up north you will need to be to

see the lights. For a normal storm kp5/6 taken near the tip of the mitt, you would need to look to the northern horizon – over an empty field or over water is best. <u>Use a tripod</u> or brace your cell phone as best as you can to reduce motion blur. Use a wide-angle lens (14-20mm), ISO 1600-3200, time 8-10 seconds. Make sure you focus on a star and get it sharp before taking your pictures. See <u>How to photograph Northern Lights – Best Settings and Tips</u> for additional discussion on how best to photograph. Use apps like:



My Aurora Forecast & Alerts and



Northern Light Aurora Forecast.

Use a light Pollution Map and watch your favorite weather app so you don't make a trip when your final destination is clouded over.

Finally, be polite!

- DON'T flash your flashlight or red headlamp everywhere. It will end up in everyone's photo.
 DON'T leave your car lights on, park away from where other photographers are set up.
- DON'T share small beach locations on Social Media – give approximate locations so people know where to look but won't overcrowd a beach. Aurora watching has become very popular.
- DO go out and enjoy and talk to other enthusiasts. I have had a lot of fun waiting for the lights and talking to others.
- DO take test shots with your camera while you are waiting to see when they start as sometimes they do not have any color to the naked eye but you will see fabulous color on your camera.

I hope this helps inspire a few others to go out. Use the SPPC Trips FaceBook Page or SPPC Shared Images FB page to see if others want to go out and shoot with you or to share your images.



NEWS -

PSA has updated the PSA Nature Judging Guide in September of 2021. The PSA has added more examples to further clarify what is legal and what is not legal. Please look on GDCCC's web site in the documents section for the new version (coming soon but in the meantime – it is on the PSA website here). The GDCCC DPD and Print rules for 2024 are also on the GDCCC website.

The GDCCC follows along with the PSA guidelines for Nature. PSA has a Wildlife category, which is different from the Nature category. The rules regarding Wildlife do not apply to GDCCC Nature images.
