

Congratulations to Jim Dietrich for taking this beautiful shot that really caught my attention this month and became the first cover image for our newsletter. Jim is one of our newer members and it is really great to see both seasoned and new members posting on the Shared Images FB page. It was hard to pick just one winner as there were a lot of great shots posted. Keep them coming!

Jim's description: "This was taken in Charlevoix County, Ellsworth at the Wooden Shoe Park. I shot with a Canon R5 and an RF 15-35mm, 2.8 lens on a tripod. The settings were SS 20 seconds, F2.8 and ISO 3200. The time was around midnight if my memory serves me. When the fog or steam started to form, I did a subtle light painting of it really for only like one second. The milky way was not very strong, so the added steam was a real blessing for this image. I was shooting with my brother from Charlevoix. I try to get up there to shoot with him as often as I can as I'm still working. I have 3 brothers who are photographers, and it is always special to shoot with them."

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Member Spotlight – Bobbie Lewis

For those of you that do not know, Bobbie is one of our 2

Vice Presidents in the club and another long-time member. She joined Seven Ponds Photography Club after its first Expo. While she said she really didn't get into learning and exploring photography until later, she started when she was much younger with a Minolta Polaroid camera that her mom gave her. She knew then that she loved it and was designated the family photographer at all the get togethers. A Polaroid only had 10 pictures and the film was not cheap, so she tended to think out her shot carefully before taking it. Pictures then and now represented memories - of people, places, emotions, and special events. Her favorite pictures she ever took, even with all her awards, are pictures she took of her mom and dad. She now shoots a mirrorless camera – Nikon Z8. A far crv from the first Polaroid but some lessons learned carry on.

I asked Bobbie what made her really start getting into photography. She said after being Jim's gear Sherpa for quite a while, she would sometimes wonder (aloud) why taking a shot would take so long. Jim would respond that there was more to it than just snapping a picture. He gave her one of his cameras and some more detailed instructions and she started to really get interested. She said Jim



continues to inspire and challenge her and push her beyond what she originally thought she could do. She still assists Jim on his shoots, but now she is creating quite a few award-winning photos of her own. When I asked right now what she enjoys shooting the most, she replied – flowers.



Like most people I interview, I like to know what inspires them. Bobbie sweetly replied, everyone in the club. She said she gets inspiration from everyone – from looking at the different competition images, shared images and from the first Friday club speakers. She said she had learned to look at more details - from Mike Moats. Dale Vronch also gave a talk about intentional camera blur, and we have had guest speakers talk about photographing wildlife and lighting (our Boudour Photography 101 that turned in to Lighting 101 class). She remembered a talk that was given by Bob Rentschler, Photography Program Coordinator and Professor at Mott Community College, where he challenged his students to imagine the picture you want before you take it. What do you want your subject/focus to be and how to get that across to the viewer? I do remember Bob's talk and liked the way he told us how he challenged his students (take 20 different shots of the same subject); he told us how color worked, rules of composition and how to boldly break the rules by showing us examples of doing just that. I found this article that goes over a few things that Bob used with his students which Bobbie talk reminded me of - 10 Photography Exercises to Boost Your Skills. I had

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forgotten about those lessons until Bobbie had reminded me of all the great speakers, we have had.

Outside of work and being a Sherpa, Bobbie became a Tribute Rosie in 2016. She was helping Jim with a Rosie shoot and was asked to join and



answered the call. Ironically, that was part of what being a Rosie was all about. Women answered the call to go into the factories to work to help in the war effort. It was out of some's comfort zone, but they went.

Some women (like her

maternal and paternal grandmothers) lived outside the urban areas and grew a <u>Victory Garden</u> to show support and to help prevent food shortages. Bobbie said she had another Rosie connection. She had a neighbor (Erma Carlson) when growing up that had been a Rosie at Willow Run. Amazing to think years later she would be photographing at that very airport not only some of the planes they build but the women that build them.

When I asked Bobbie where she got her photographic inspiration from, she said ... from all over. She said while she did not follow any one photographer, she admired Ansel Adams and would look at his work for Black & Whites. She also said she liked to go to Barnes & Noble (or library) and spend time there looking at the photography magazines. PSA also produces a magazine that she will look at for ideas. As for words of advice - she said never stop trying. She has spent years watching Jim and has learned photography is not as easy as it looks but that does not mean you have to stay locked in one way of doing things. Don't be afraid to try things. Some things will work for you and others won't. By trying, you will learn new things and maybe develop your next favorite

technique. We have the advantage of digital images today. You are not limited to 10 Polaroid shots.



We had a small group that met at the farm at 10 am after a brief rain. The skies provided a nice natural diffuser for us but as the day went on, the wind picked up. Overall, it was a great day for shooting and getting fresh flowers and vegetables.

Note – if you go to Ankley Farms to photograph in the fields, there is a charge of ~\$10. Bring a diffuser, tripod, backgrounds (see Mike Moat's video on that) and boots as the fields can get muddy. I have discovered a stool is helpful as well.

Steel Wool Fun Shoot 10-13-

Friday the 13th of October was a great night for the steel wool fun shoot at the Eastern Michigan State Fair Grounds in Imlay City, Michigan. 13 members of the Seven Ponds Photo Club attended the night of spark photography. Steel wool photography involves using long exposures to capture the motion of hot embers flying through the night. This event starts by setting fire to a material called steel wool that is sitting inside a metal whisk. The metal whisk is attached to a chain and then some brave individual spins the burning wool around in the air sending glowing hot embers of steel wool fly out. The flying embers create orange/gold streaks of light which are captured by the camera. A special thank you to Jim Lewis for organizing the event and Volume 6 Issue 5

Feature - Diptych

For those that are not familiar with this technique, Diptych photography consists of a single photograph which is a combination of two images placed immediately next to each other to make an artistic statement or comparison. The photographs can be of the same subject, or they can be different; there are no hard and fast rules – they simply must be next to each other. They images can be either joined together or they can be separated by a border. The word itself comes from ancient Greek. Think of diptychs as collages. In some cases, three images are used but that is called a triptych. When placing the images next to each other, several tutorials show how color from one image should be repeated or an opposite color used, it was also suggested to try to have lines from one image extend into the other. See <u>How to Create Diptychs/Triptychs</u> - part 1 and <u>How to Create Diptych/Triptych - part 2</u> for a good overview of what to look for and how to create them.




The first few I tried were simple same subject comparisons. The first was taken at the Michigan Central Train Depot.

The second image was taken on Labor Day 2023. I was walking the bridge and had just taken a quick photo looking straight down through the grating of the bridge, only to find a man doing the exact same thing.

Diptych is not a new art form. It has been around a long time, some pieces as old as 506 AD. See <u>Diptych Art – A Look at the History</u> and Style of Diptych Artwork. I have given a couple examples here but for more examples plus some "*how to's*" on create them, check out <u>Diptych</u> <u>Photography: What It is | 15 Great</u> <u>Ideas to Power Your Photos</u>.
