Filters for Landscape Photography

GDCCC sponsored event

Presentor – David DesRochers Notes taken by – Germaine Finley



David DesRochers was the presentor at this GDCCC sponsored event on Feb, 16th, 2021. Noah Buchanan, Gary Farber were the sales reps from Hunt's Photo. The goal of this online instructional program was to learn field practices to

inspire one to approach landscape photography in a new way. In addition to discussing the use of filters for landscape photography, David covered equipment, planning, and the elements of composition that are key to creating photos worthy of a gallery wall.

David is a very talented nature photographer and a fun speaker. Check out more from Dave at his website - www.desrochersphotography.com.

Below are some notes that were taken on his presentation:

Dave started off by going through different camera types – Full frame vs crop frame, mirror less. He mentioned that there is an increasing movement to the mirror less cameras. See www.dxomark.com for objective, independent, RAW based image quality performance data.

He also illustrated using your histogram and the benefit of "shooting to the right" or commonly referred to as "Exposing to the Right (ETTR).

Basically that is slightly overexposing your image to not lose detail in the shadows. Make sure to watch the histogram so you do not overexpose too much and then lose detail in the highlights. By shooting to the right the camera will be able to capture more details and then it is your choice during the post processing to rebalance the image.

Landscape Lenses:

Ultra wide:

- Zoom 17-40mm f/4 or EF 16-35 mm f/4
- Fixed 14 mm f/2.8 or 20 mm f/1.8

Standard Zoom: 24 to 105 mm

 50mm or higher recommended for Panoramas

Telephoto Zoom – For hiking around Dave said he uses 70-200mm with 1.4 teleconverter

- Ideal for capturing "Intimate Landscapes"
- Ability to compress a scene

Overview of different filters:

UV Filters -

- Reduces the appearances of atmospheric haze caused by Ultra Violet radiation
- Protects the front element of the lens
- Thin design for minimal vignetting
- Look for high quality glass

Circular Polarizing Filters -

- Decreases light reflecting off moisture in the stratosphere, darkening the sky and increasing contrast.
 - Note you need to face 90 degrees from the sun for this to work.
- Removes glare on wet surfaces
- Typically lose 1 ½ 2 stops of light

Graduated Neutral Density (GND) Filters -

Round screw on vs Filter Holder System

- ✓ Round screw on can limit composition options. Horizon line in filter is fixed
- ✓ Filter holding system is recommended

<u>Medium GND Filter</u> – good for uneven horizon <u>Soft GND Filter</u> - good for uneven horizon <u>Hard GND Filter</u> - good for flat/even horizon <u>Reverse GND Filter</u> – good for sunset to darken the middle band

Optical Glass vs Resin Basically Resin breaks less and is cheaper but sacrifices best possible light transmission and image quality.

Neutral Density Filters – use for long exposures Round screw or Filter holding system can be used but a holding system is recommended. Less Vignette and interchangeability with various lens sizes

Natural Night Filter -

Blocks light wavelengths from common sources of light pollution. Good for astrophotography and night scenes

Dave said he has used various filter holding systems including - Lee and NiSi and was happy with both of those.

Field Practices:

Plan your trips!

- ✓ Use Photography Guide books, Photo Travelers Guide (<u>www.phototripusa.com</u>), National Park Web Sites, Google images, etc.
- ✓ Know when sunrise/sunset occurs use apps or <u>www.sunrisesunset.com</u>, or <u>www.photoephemeris.com</u>

Predicting dramatic sunrise/sunsets:

- 1. 40-70% cloud cover
- 2. Clean air
- 3. Low humidity will produce more vibrant colors
- Little cloud cover in the east at sunrise/ west at sunset
- 5. Cloud base at least 6500 feet about ground level

Check weather and tides especially when photographing near the ocean (stay safe). Several apps can track the tides.

Composition

Less is more – what can I eliminate from my composition?

- ✓ Get a different angle than the crowd
- ✓ Look for Intimate Landscapes close in on a part of the scene.
- ✓ Try different light backlit, side lit

Sharp front to back images:

- ✓ Use Hyperfocal Distance Estimate the closest point to have in focus, double that and that is your hyper focal distance, place your focal point on a spot at that distance
- ✓ Focus Stacking Focus on foreground,
 Midway & distant then blend in photoshop.

Fighting for sharpness?

Possibly you need to calibrate your lens

While the culprit for a blurry image is usually user error or dirty sensor/lenses, sometimes, it may make sense to calibrate your lenses to your camera. Especially if you find you are consistently missing focus in the same way on every image.

See the following tutorial on how to calibrate a lens to a camera body. Remember this relationship is per lens. Check your camera manual to see if your camera can Auto AF Fine Tune (Nikon) or Autofocus AF Micro adjustment (Canon).
